

As part of the International Year One course, you'll begin college-level study at SF State whilst also taking a range of specially designed modules that help build English language fluency and research skills. At the same time, you'll become part of a highly supportive international community, with dedicated staff to help you adjust to your new life as a U.S. university student.

A UNIQUE OPPORTUNITY

Studying in San Francisco arguably brings you closer to the heart of the global tech industry than anywhere else in the world. 

SF State University main campus is located just east of Lake Merced, a quiet and picturesque area of the city with acres of parkland for relaxation.






SF State Downtown Campus

Studying in America

FLEXIBILITY

Compared to many university systems around the world, the U.S. system allows students a great deal of choice in how they will begin, develop and eventually concentrate their undergraduate studies.

Instead of launching immediately into the study of a single subject, U.S. colleges and universities allow students to take a range of courses in various fields from the outset. This allows students to follow their intellectual interests. develop a broader understanding, and sample different fields to gauge their potential. Students can then choose their subject of focus – their "major" - at the end of their second year.

DIVERSITY

The United States is home to over one million international students – the largest number of any country in the world. At SF State, students come to study from over 100 different countries, so you can learn about other cultures simply by making friends amongst your peers. You may even make lifelong connections that will open doors - not only in America, but also in your home nation and many other places around the world.

EMPLOYABILITY


U.S. degrees have an international reputation, and employers particularly value U.S. graduates - both for the quality of their education and for the other benefits that come with studying in America.


The experience of studying overseas demonstrates resilience, adaptability and drive, as well as developing your understanding of the wider world and different cultures. In California. you'll also have a greater chance to participate in internships and work experience than almost anywhere else on the planet – and more opportunities to meet potential employers, both during and after your degree.

POSTGRADUATE WORK EXPERIENCE

International students who have studied on an F-1 visa will also have the opportunity to engage in work experience or training within the U.S. after they have graduated. This is called Optional Practical Training (or OPT) and can be undertaken for up to one year after graduation (or two years afterward in the case of applicants with degrees in science, technology, engineering or mathematics). Training must be taken in a field related to the prior course of study.

An International Community of Learners





On campus, our energetic students run more than 200 clubs, focused on everything from politics to sports and religious organizations. At the heart of student life is our new Mashouf Wellness Center, the home of most SF State activities. It's also a major campus social hub, where student events range from workshops and careers fairs to movie nights and concerts.

Extra-curricular activities are also a great chance to build deeper connections with your peers by participating in smaller communities based on mutual interests. They can add a great deal to your time at SF State and can even help give you a broader perspective on your studies!

SPORTS

Whether you play competitive sport or simply want to try out a new pastime, there is a club for everyone at SF State. Whatever your confidence level, we aim to give every SF State student the opportunity to enjoy and take part in sports.

Our university is ranked ninth in the U.S. for intramural (intra-university) sports, but we are also active in external competitions – for instance, both women's and men's athletics teams compete in the NCAA II, CCAA and RMAC conferences.







OUR SUPPORT

SF State's Career Service and Leadership Development Center offers a range of ways to ensure that every student can make the best start to their career.

- Careers events: These include a fall and spring career fair, a part-time job fair, and a graduate school fair. We also offer a wide variety of workshops to all current SF State students and alumni.
- Resources: The Career Service provides

 a number of careers-oriented webinars,
 as well as written and video guides
 on how to write resumes, apply for
 internships and approach graduate school
 admissions. Face-to-face practice interviews
 in various fields are also offered.
- Partnerships with industry:

Collaborations with strategic partners like Genentech and the CSU Entertainment Alliance create many opportunities for students in the state's top industries.

Special courses: The President's Leadership
Fellows Course helps students develop soft
skills including resume writing, interview
skills and networking. Workshops are also
provided on leadership, teamwork, critical
thinking, unconscious bias and emotional
intelligence. Alternatively, the San Francisco
Venture Capital Fast Pitch Conference gives
students a chance to pitch their ideas to
venture capitalists and angel investors:
to date, it has won millions of dollars in
investment for student and graduate startups.

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The combination of courses you take in International Year One depends on your level of English language skills at the outset:

- Students with the minimum 4.5 IELTS / 45 TOEFL iBT (or equivalent) will be enrolled in International Year One for 3 terms. The first term will focus primarily on gaining English language and academic skills through our non-credit courses (29 hours per week). You will also experience your first credit-bearing course Living in San Francisco (1 unit).
- Students with an English proficiency score of 5.0 IELTS / 50 TOEFL iBT (or equivalent) and 5.5 IELTS / TOEFL 55 will be enrolled in International Year One for 2 terms, beginning their first term with a combination of non-credit English language courses (10-18 hours per week) and 7-11 units of credit-bearing coursework.

Most students will complete International Year One having earned 18 - 24 credits towards their SF State degree.

As you progress through International Year One, the hours spent on English language instruction gradually decrease, while the hours of credit-bearing coursework increase – until you matriculate into your second year at SF State with a full schedule of credit-bearing coursework.





NON-CREDIT COURSES

International Year One non-credit courses are designed to supplement and support your wider studies at SF State. They cover a wide range of topics including:

- English for Academic Purposes to strengthen and develop listening, speaking, reading, writing, and critical thinking in the university context.
- Academic acculturation on matters such as plagiarism, study skills, collaboration, critical thinking, active class participation, course requirements/ expectations, and research
- Small group seminars to support the content of the credit-bearing courses
- Living in San Francisco

Extra Support

Our full-time student services manager will also be on campus to provide International Year One students with ongoing assistance and guidance. This support covers academic issues as well as practical, social and emotional needs arising from the transition to studying in the U.S.

Writing the First Year: Global Perspectives of Multilingual Speakers Stretch II (Credits: 4)

Students will need to have achieved a C- or better in the first term of this class. The second semester of this class will allow extra time to revisit and practice reading and writing strategies to improve English fluency.

Critical Thinking and the Ethnic Studies Experience (Credits: 3)

Basic skills involved in understanding, criticizing, and constructing arguments by using materials reflective of experiences of ethnic/racial groups in the U.S.

University Support Classes

Integrated Skills Course

Students will develop their ability to master everyday English communication skills in an American context, socially, professionally, and academically.

English for Academic Purposes

The course teaches students the English language and critical thinking skills needed to achieve academic success according to American university expectations.

- EAP High Intermediate: Minimum of 5.0 IELTS or equivalent
- EAP Advanced: Minimum of 5.5 IELTS or equivalent

Academic Success Skills

This course will focus on the social, academic. and professional skills required to succeed in an American higher education setting and on the campus of San Francisco State University.

Academic Support

In a small group, students are encouraged to talk, think, and share more readily than in a larger group.

Immersive Experience

SF State offers a range of co-curricular and extra-curricular activities that ensure all international students enjoy a truly immersive experience, nurturing individual success and community connections.







REQUIREMENTS FOR INTERNATIONAL YEAR ONE STUDENTS

To be admitted to SF State, applicants must demonstrate a minimum English proficiency score of 4.5 IELTS / 45 TOEFL iBT (or equivalent), as well meet or exceed, the academic entry criteria listed on pages 38 to 41.

Students' level of English language skills at the outset will also determine their route through International Year One.

Those with an English proficiency score of 5.0 IELTS / 50 TOEFL iBT (or equivalent) will be able to take standard credit-bearing courses from the beginning of their first year, while those with lower scores will first receive a more intensive course of English language instruction. (For further details, see the previous section on Courses.)

REQUIREMENTS FOR TRANSFER TO SF STATE – YEAR 2

To complete International Year One and matriculate into their second year at SF State, students must successfully complete a minimum of 18 academic units earning a "C" (2.0) Grade Point Average or higher and demonstrate English Proficiency by earning a 2.0 GPA and a CR or C– or better in ENG 202.
